# The Diseases of Fish (England and Wales) Order 2007

Made - - - - 15th March 2007

Laid before Parliament 16th March 2007

Coming into force - 6th April 2007

The Secretary of State, in exercise of the powers conferred on him by section 13(1) of the Diseases of Fish Act 1937(a), makes the following Order.

### Title, extent and commencement

**1.** This Order may be cited as the Diseases of Fish (England and Wales) Order 2007; it extends to England and Wales and comes into force on 6th April 2007.

### Amendment of definition of "infected" in Diseases of Fish Act 1937

**2.** In the definition of "infected" in section 10(1) of the Diseases of Fish Act 1937(**b**), after "infectious salmon anaemia (ISA)," insert "Koi Herpesvirus Disease,".
